Following on from my research into the Nattai-Bulli Lodge banner, Ben and I spent a morning going through photos in the May Day Committee collection in Wollongong University archives. We confined the search to photos, but there were eight boxes of minutes, correspondence etc should anyone want to write a history of the May Day celebrations. Our banner features the words "United we stand, Divided we fall" and these words also feature in other banners from 1938 together with "Workers of the World Unite, You have nothing to lose but your chains".

These banners represent the IWW, (Industrial Workers of the World) and this was confirmed by Mr Fred Moore, who has been heavily involved in the Trade Union movement and the Miner's Federation, and was a key figure in campaigning for worker's rights in Australia, as well as agitating for Aboriginal rights. Fred Moore served as chairman of the May Day Committee for over twenty years, and has been bestowed life -member status of the Miners Federation and the Miners'

Women's Auxiliary (the only man alive of very few to be made an member of honorary movement in history). The South Coast Trade Union Centre, "Fred Moore House" has been named for him. We met Fred at Fred Moore House and he showed us their collection of mining memorabilia



and talked to us about May Day marches and union activities. Fred's memory is amazing! He has 95 years of memories to share and should be recognised as a National Treasure!

Agriculture in The Oaks 1897 - Part 5

Agriculture In The Oaks (Part 5)

To the north of Mr. McEvoy's farm lies the small compact holding occupied by Mr. J. Guerin, the homestead being situated just round the sweep of the hill. To the west there is the primeval bush, which, save for the Oakdale road, extends unbrokenly to Burragorang, on the north the valley road bounds the farm, and the Werriberri flats terminate its eastern frontage.

On these flats The Oaks folks gather themselves on gala days. There they hold their races, and have their sports, and their foot-racing, and sit under the shade of the gum trees, and indulge in the mild dissipation of lemonade ad libitum. Here there was cultivation in the early days, and in an elbow of the creek, where sweet briars now cluster, a garden graced the banks of the gloomy watercourse, and the tobacco plant flourished in green luxuriance, and excellent, aromatic home cured leaf cheered the pioneer's lonely leisure.

Butter-making is the chief business on this little farm, and a tiny white-washed building attests the vigilance of the authorities in the administration of an Act which presses harshly on the dairying industry. The little corn grown has felt the full force of this year's drought, but a paddock of four acres, devoted exclusively to the growth of oaten hay, well cultivated and highly manured, fully repays the care bestowed upon it.

This year's crop came in at a time when hay was in great demand, when the district depended upon importations from outside, and famine prices ruled for fodder. The result of sensible and intense culture, thus applied to a plot of four acres, was an aggregate yield of ten tons of the finest oaten hay.

Personally, Mr. Guerin is an intelligent man of good physique, and a son of the soil. People such as Guerin and his devoted wife constitute, of all others, the class which has the deepest affection for the soil from which it has sprung. Their patriotism is heartfelt and unaffected. The ragged bush and brown uplands recall the sacred associations of their childhood, the very gum trees, to whose outlandishness the stranger is unable to reconcile himself, lend a necessary feature to the homelike beauty of their landscape.

They are happier here than elsewhere, and it were wisdom to encourage into permanence this deep-seated reverence for the soil. And when adverse times come, and nature withholds the plenitude of her gifts, when their cattle perish, and the sources of livelihood disappear, it becomes the duty of high-souled ministers of state to assist them by offering them every description of employment at their disposal, and in all cases where the question of public employment is concerned, to see that the settler takes precedent of the tramp.

RABAUL PRESENTATION

At our last meeting Allen Seymour spoke about a recent visit to Rabaul with his brother George. Rabaul is in Papua New Guinea on the island of New Britain. Their father went there in 1946 with the army, their mother flew up there in 1947 and they were married the same day.

Rabaul has a deep harbour which is an old volcano and it is ringed by a number of volcanos. Eruptions occurred in 1878 and 1937. The last eruption was in 1993 and this destroyed a large portion of the town. The population before the 1993 eruption was 17000, population now is below 4000.

Rabaul was originally controlled by the Germans and was the site of Australia's first military action in World War 1. In World War 2 it was invaded by the Japanese and then heavily bombed by the Americans. There are lots of tunnels around the town dug by the Japanese. Transport is by mini buses and trucks and utes that carry people in the rear.

Rotolactor **The Camden Park Estate**

In 1950, Camden Park confirmed it was Pigs were raised on skim milk from the brought to Australia by Lieutenant-Colonel Edward Macarthur-Onslow. The plans were drawn locally and the foundation stone laid in 1950. The building was finished in September 1952.

It was in effect a multi-cow rotary property. milking machine 18.3 automatic metres in diameter. whole circumference was enclosed with glass windows to give natural light, which supplemented by artificial was fluorescent tube lighting for early mornings and winter afternoons. The mechanism consisted of a circular platform mounted on 20, 30.48 cm The rotolactor was an Australian icon. roller bearing steel which rotated anticlockwise on 2, 13.6 kg circular rails above the floor.

Normally with the 50 bails operating the rate was 300-375 cows an hour with ten operators. Each cow was stripped of milk in 5 to 7 minutes. The 900 vard cows were mainly fed with concentrates and roughage from the irrigated acres of the Cowpasture Flats bordering the river. Each cow gave an average of 12.5 litres of 4.3 butterfat milk. > The other activities of the Estate varied from poultry farming and fruit growing to running the general store for Menangle Village. Menangle is no longer a private village, the store is now in private hands, and the orchard is no longer in operation. ■

In the 1950s and 1960s up to 2,000 visitors a week saw it in action at resting on concrete walls 1.8 metres Menangle. Overall, about three million people visited it.

> There was a milk bar at the rotolactor also operated by Camden Park. It served milkshakes and ice creams to visitors and was extremely popular. The rotolactor closed around 1977 but reopened a few years later. It finally closed about 1983. There was only one rotolactor in Australia but there are many rotary dairies. The rotolactor was the forerunner to them and decades ahead of its time.





CYCLING COMMUNITIES: BICYCLE CLUBS IN AUSTRALIA

The formation of bicycle clubs in Australia closely reflects the costs of purchasing a bicycle. In the 1860s it was largely a time for the rich and affluent, but by the 1890s it widened to include the middle classes and by the turn of the twentieth century, opportunities opened up for the first time to the working classes. By the 1960s and especially in the 1970s, bicycle users turned away from the low tech bicycle towards the now affordable automobile. However by the 1990s and 2000s the bicycle acquired new meanings, practicalities and charm of bicycles were discovered yet again by new affluent professional classes. 




Beautiful day for a drive
